<u>"The irrational season"</u> This is the irrational season When love blooms bright and wild. Had Mary been filled with reason There'd have been no room for the child. ~ Madeleine L'Engle

Advent is a wonderfully irrational season. It makes no sense that the Creator of the Universe would be willing to be as vulnerable as a baby. It is not rational to think that the mysterious Author of Life would place signs and wonders – a star! – in the heavens, pointing the way to anyone who was willing to look up, to watch, and to wonder. And it is not reasonable to expect that God Almighty would be born in a stable, surrounded by animals, and watched over tenderly by his young parents.

And yet that is the joy and wonder of Advent. It is that season when we celebrate that God is willing to surprise us and to come into our lives in unexpected ways.

- Just when Israel had reached its lowest level of despair, hope was given.
- Just when the darkness threatened to overcome the nation and everyone in it, light arrived.
- Just when Mary thought that she would be

an ordinary girl living an unremarkable life, an angel appeared.

This is what we celebrate in the season of Advent – that God surprises us, that we cannot "figure out" God because God acts in ways that may seem irrational to our human understanding. The Good News of Advent is that God chooses to enter into our lives and break through our complacent routines. Surprise! God the irrational announces that – despite all the evidence to the contrary – there is reason to hope.

That hope comes right from the angel's lips: Behold, I bring you tidings of great joy. Unto you is born this day a Savior, who is Christ the Lord. Advent tells us:

- We are not alone
- God is Emmanuel, always with us.

It may not make sense that God would choose to come to us. It may not seem rational that the Almighty would shower love and forgiveness and new life on us, but that is what God does – today and every day.

Celebrate the irrational!

Celebrate the mercy of God!



LBS News

(Ladies Benevolent Society)

LBS met on November 15 with 14 women in attendance. We reviewed the preliminary results for our Holly Fair of \$9,817 which does not include all expenses. We voted to give \$3,000 of this to the EWCC General Fund and to use some of the funds to:

- 1. Purchase a new upright freezer to replace the old one.
- 2. Purchase kitchen utensils for cooking; some commercial baking sheets; and a couple of frying pans.
- 3. Purchase seasonal 8-foot long tablecloths 4 of each.
- 4. Fund the breakfast for our Annual Meeting

We have set aside funds for commitments as follows:

- 1. Painting of sanctuary \$5,000
- 2. Refurbishment of sanctuary and narthex \$7,000

We reviewed needed changes/improvements for next year's Holly Fair. We need giftable items and Christmas decorations since we had very little left after our sale! As you go through your decorations this month, please give us the things that you are no longer using! We also need to provide lunch for our volunteers!

Our next meeting is on December 13 and will be hosted by Susan Converse and Pam Brown. All are welcome to join in the festivities. Please consider bringing a gift card to local supermarkets or gas stations. These will be given to Pastor Sue for distribution as needed during the coming year.

Refurbishment Committee Update

Our Refurbishment Committee has been working hard as we continue to explore ways to address the needs of current and future congregations while celebrating the legacy and personality of our beloved Church.

You may have noticed that the existing sconces on the balconies were taken down for refurbishment. They are being re-wired and repainted and will be placed back in position for Advent with a new dimmable switch and new frosted LED bulbs. Our refurbished lights are a good fit with the aesthetics of our Sanctuary and will offer more light with less wattage.

In addition, with recent failures to our antiquated soundboard that controls the audio for both our in-person and online worship services, it's time to update our audio equipment to accommodate our expanding needs. We hope to replace our existing soundboard and related audio accessories in the near future so that we can be confident in offering quality live and online audio streaming.

Look for more updates as we continue to work with contractors and specialists who have been helping us evaluate our current Sanctuary and Narthex infrastructure, offering guidance for possible layout modifications to provide more worship flexibility, and providing estimates for cosmetic and refurbishment opportunities.

We couldn't begin to do any of these upgrades without your interest and involvement. On behalf of our Refurbishment Committee, we encourage your ongoing support and input, and look forward to continuing to partner with you, strengthen our faith, and make our Church welcoming for all.



Looking far ahead, there will be a clothing drive in January. Men's winter clothes will be our primary focus. There will be reminders as we get closer to the date.


