pastor's message

Albert Einstein, probably the most famous scientist in modern times, in 1930 wrote the book What I Believe in which he said, "The most beautiful emotion we can experience is the mysterious. It is the fundamental emotion that stands at the cradle of all true art and science. . . . To sense that behind anything that can be experienced there is something that our minds cannot grasp, whose beauty and sublimity reaches us only indirectly: this is religiousness."\*

Einstein emphasized that comprehending our universe scientifically relies upon belief in the God who brought about this universe. Acknowledging a divine Creator in one's scientific worldview brings understanding to what was once not understood. At the same time, Einstein realized the profound truth that some things are beyond scientific explanations, such as God, love, and faith. Einstein had reverence for the mysterious.

The mysterious, I would say, is also the source of our Christian faith, especially the resurrection. We should not be embarrassed to admit that the resurrection of the dead is beyond scientific or rational explanation. We should not be ashamed to profess that God's raising Jesus Christ from the dead, and to believe that God will resurrect our dead bodies one day also, is truly a mystery. After all, how could someone who is biologically

dead ever return to life? Do we experience anything in the physical world that does this? And our faith teaches us not only that Christ returned to life three days later (actually between 36 and 39 hours later) but also that he did so in a glorified body never to die again. And the same is promised to each of us who believe in Christ as our Lord and Redeemer.

The experience of the early believers that Christ was alive again motivated them to gather together on Sunday, the day God raised Jesus from the dead, to worship the astounding God who accomplished this amazing feat. We need to observe that same practice today. To claim that one believes in the resurrection, but does not attend church is like saying one is a Boston Red Sox fan, but never attends their games at Fenway Park, never watches Sox games on television, never listens to their games on the radio, never goes online to see if they won or lost nor studies their box scores to see who played and how they performed. What kind of a Red Sox fan is that? If we do not attend worship services, what does that testify about our belief in the resurrection? What does that say about our claim to be a follower of Jesus?

What we must really do as Christians is reverence the resurrection. We must hold God's raising Jesus Christ from the dead as the cornerstone of our faith. We must hold it in high honor. We must cling to it with profound awe and respect. We must proclaim it as one of the cardinal mysteries of our faith, as is said on the Sundays when we celebrate Holy Communion: "Christ has died. Christ is risen. Christ will come again." Even on those Sundays when we don't recite this confession, we show by our presence in the congregation that we worship the God who raised Jesus from the dead in a glorified, immortal physical body. We do this in anticipation of our own selves being resurrected from the dead one day.






