# OUTREACH STRETCHES EVERY RESOURCE FOR OUR COMMUNITIES' & NEIGHBORS' NEEDS

The Outreach Committee recently received letters of gratitude and commendation for donations received from both individuals and area agencies that support people with various needs. Through our Outreach program, our congregation provides such generous support.

We were able to respond to California Wildfire Relief: "[Because of] your gift of \$500...displaced families in need of shelter and necessities will receive support...[including] long-term recovery efforts...." EWCC also contributed 359.4 pounds of food for TEEG's food programs. Those contributions help them to serve individual and families in the greater

# Dastor's incesa

October is the month in which we celebrate the **Protestant Reformation.** 

On October 31, 1517, a Roman Catholic monk, Martin Luther, nailed to the castle door in Wittenberg, Germany, 95 propositions, or points of dispute, in order to begin a theological discussion with any who might like to debate with him the truth of God's Word. These came to be known in history as the "95 Theses." This act by Luther launched the Protestant Reformation.

One of the notable results of the Reformation was the printing of the Bible in the vernacular, or local language, of the people. Up until that time in Europe, the church service was all in Latin, the language of the priests. The common people did not understand Latin. Much of Luther's theological career after he began the movement to reform the church was spent translating the Old and New Testaments into the German language so that the common people would be able to read God's Word in their own tongue.

Many of us who belong to mainline/liberal Protestant congregations believe that it is more precise to say that the Bible contains God's Word rather than saying that the Bible is God's Word. For example, the Preamble of the Constitution of the United Church of Christ states that the UCC "looks to the Word of God in the Scriptures...."

The reason why we don't make the absolute equation of the Bible and the Word of God is because God's speech cannot be perfectly expressed by less than

perfect human beings, no matter how spiritually insightful the writers may have been. We must remember that Jesus Christ did not write anything in the Bible. The New Testament was written by faithful followers of Jesus, who clearly were inspired by his life, teachings, and, especially, his resurrection from the dead, but nevertheless were prone to error as all humans are.

Furthermore, the Word of God is much more than what is written in the Bible. The first chapter of the Gospel of John makes clear that Jesus himself is the Word of God who "became flesh and lived among us . . . . " (John 1:14, NRSV). The last verse of that gospel states: "But there are also many other things that Jesus did; if every one of them were written down, I suppose that the world itself could not contain the books that would be written" (John 21:25, NRSV). The Word of God cannot be contained within any single book, not even the Bible. The Word of God is so glorious that nothing in the world can enclose it.

Finally, creation itself reveals the Word of God. This speech from God can be discerned from our experience in creation, such as doing good and avoiding evil, which all persons recognize, Christian and non-Christian. We may disagree on the specifics of what comprises good and evil, but every culture in the world has a basic sense of justice, for example. From where do they get this idea? Whether we are aware or not, we affirm this norm of justice because the Word of God in the created order--or through our personal experience in the world if you prefer--is revealing this concept of justice to us. As with Jesus Christ, the Bible points beyond itself to the Word of God (through which all things were made) in creation.

And so, we see that the Word of God is found in more than just the Bible. The Bible contains the Word of God in its inscripturated form. Jesus Christ is the incarnate Word of God, the Word of God made flesh. And creation reveals what we can call the ordered Word of God. All of those "Let there be's" of the first chapter of Genesis reveal God's speaking the Word that imposes a specific order to each area of creation. Acknowledging this threefold Word of God is part of the legacy of being a Protestant Christian. Let us remember this wonderful truth this month as we celebrate the Protestant Reformation.

# PARSONAGE KITCHEN RENOVATION

The total renovation of our parsonage kitchen has been completed, and the parsonage kitchen is now ready to offer to a new minister or for us to maintain as a rental property. The attached pho-



tos do not fully illustrate the amazing transformation that took place. The existing kitchen, installed in the 1970s following a fire in the parsonage, was tired and in need of an upgrade. New cabinets, one window, flooring and countertops, electrical system, and appliances were installed. The kitchen is now much more functional and an attractive environment for the family to relax.

We were very close to meeting our original budget of \$26,200, thanks to the significant donations of time and materials from several church members. Seth and DeEtta Spalding contributed throughout the project with donations of their time, truck, and trailer for dump runs, as well as good offices in securing in-kind contributions of labor. Steve Integlia (Seth and DeEtta's son-in-law) donated his labor for the new ceiling. Cory Dancosse, of C&J Electrical, contributed generously with his extra work and labor to upgrade the parsonage's electrical service. Phil Parizeau's assistance was significant, guiding us in writing our

RFQ and offering support throughout the entire project. Kerstin Forrester, Allan Walker, and Judith Wong took the lead on choosing and purchasing appliances and colors. And, of course, Peter Green lent his painting skills to the project. Thanks to all of these volunteers and their generosity with time and financial support, we were able to complete a significant upgrade to our parsonage property at a very affordable cost.

# **JUDGING A BOOK BY....?**

A few weeks back, a small group of EWCC congregants met after church to discuss ways we could take action around the issue of banned books as a church.


First, up until 2023 there were no book bannings on record in Connecticut. That year there were 14-17 book challenges (the data is not precise) covering over 100 different titles. However, across the United States there have been book bannings happening probably since the early days of our country. People have requested to have books banned from schools and public libraries for a variety of reasons.

Alice Walker's The Color Purple has been recommended to be banned for religious objections, homosexuality, violence, the use of slang and profanity, and more. Mark Twain's Adventures of Huckleberry Finn is often banned due to its use of racial slurs, its ethnic stereotypes, and just because it makes people uncomfortable. The Harry Potter series has been banned in places because of magic. And probably every book that has any LGBTQ+ mention has been banned for those theme, words, etc.

In recent years books are being banned just because the authors are African-American or Chinese; Jerry Craft's graphic novel New Kid for example, and Grace Lin's picture book A Big Mooncake for Little Star. Attach are the suggestions that Pastor Gary pulled together after watching the UCC's webinar on banned books.

## SUGGESTIONS FROM THE GROUP:

- for Pastor Gary to bring the idea of forming a formal group to church council. They also asked him to speak to the deacons about allowing a few minutes of "book reports" during worship for a few weeks.
- The group believes the book reports would be a good way to launch some other action.
- Our church already has the beginnings of a Banned Book Library with our LGBTQ+ library. As Pastor Gary talked about, many teens struggle to get access to such books because their parents do



not approve. However, getting those same teens into our building can be a challenge.

- Starting a Safe Space Youth Group, but it would need other adult mentors to commit to the time, and the Christian Ed would then need to reclaim some of the space they have shared in the school house. Even supportive families with LGBTQ+ members could use more community support! And they are often the people who know other people without support, who would appreciate easy access to such books.
- A Little Free Banned Book Library on the church lawn was also suggested.
   How to advertise said library was discussed because it would need to be done very carefully.

Further discussion will need to happen. If you are interested in continuing this work, please reach out and let me know. In order for any action to be happening we need more people doing the work together.








# Parable Of The Sower



During Jesus' Lifetime He spoke in many parables, one of them was the Parable of the Sower. Jesus said, "Behold, a sower went forth to sow..."


