ANNUAL MEETING MINUTES, January 28, 2024 (Breakfast Church)

11:14AM- Annual Meeting officially opened by Dawn Adiletta, Moderator

Choir sang the hymn, "God, Be In My Head".

Pastor Susan Foster led the congregation in the prayer.

The Covenant was read.

Dawn Adiletta, Moderator, reminded the Congregation that all are welcome to participate in the Annual Meeting, but only church members are allowed to make motions, second a motion and vote on those motions brought before the congregation.

The minutes of the January 29, 2023 Annual Meeting were reviewed. A motion was made by Kerstin Forrester and seconded by DeEtta Spalding to accept the minutes from the 2023 Annual Meeting as presented in the report. The motion passed.

The Pastor's Report was given. Pastor Sue was very grateful and blessed to be Pastor of EWCC for so many wonderful years, and many thanks to the staff and Heidi Tucker for all of their hard work throughout the year.

The Nominating Committee presented their report and opened nominations up. Mark Billings gave the report and thanked everyone who has served and offers to serve on all of the various committees. A motion was made by Glen Lessig and seconded by Tom Stokes to accept the Nominating Committee's report. The motion passed.

After all of the Committee reports were presented in the order in which they were printed, Amy Hiller White made a motion and Glen Lessig seconded the motion to accept all of the Committee reports as presented. The motion passed.

The Society Committee presented the Budget. DeEtta Spalding, EWCC Treasurer, gave the report. Highlights included:

- Giving increased by over \$3000
- Jamboree did not meet its goal because of weather
- There are unfilled positions
- CE had a surplus in budget
- Repair work on the parsonage
- Surplus for the 2023 year: \$4,870.00 which is recommended to be moved to the church's Operating Reserves.
- It is thought that 2024 expenses will be less because of it being a Transition year.
- There is a new line item in the budget for "Interim Minister".
- Sue's salary is for a ½ year.
- Sue's medical coverage will be changing to Medicare
- Maybe money saved will be put into a capital set-aside account for the Parsonage.

Discussion regarding the EWCC Transition process was asked by Mark Billings with regards to the parsonage and the current tenants. It was explained that the current tenants are on a year to year lease, and the search process would begin for an Interim Minister and a permanent replacement is a long way off, i.e. up to two years. Amy Hiller White mentioned the kitchen at the parsonage that is reported to be in need of renovation. Society is having preliminary discussions and will be getting quotes to renovate the kitchen. Glen Lessig explained the next steps to take place regarding the renovation of the parsonage kitchen with the congregation.

Voting

Motion 1: Kerstin Forrester made a motion and Alan Walker seconded to accept the EWCC 2023 Annual Report as presented. The motion passed.

Motion 2: Pam Brown made a motion and Jeff Wong seconded to accept the 2024 Budget as presented. The motion passed.

Motion 3: Lynn Looby made a motion and Kerstin Forrester seconded to allocate \$10,200 for the housing allowance for Pastor Sue Foster from January 1 to June 30, 2024. The motion passed.

Motion 4: Lynn Looby made a motion and Glen Lessig seconded to move \$4870 (surplus) to the 2024 Operating Reserve line item, and the forecasted \$15,368 to the Capital Reserve line item, if obtained. The motion passed.

A motion was made by John Davis and seconded by Tom Stokes to adjourn the Annual Meeting at 11:53am. The motion passed.

Transition #2 and Search and Call Committees Expectations

The Transition #2 (T2) Committee of EWCC will take the hand-off from the Transition #1 (T1) Committee. The T1 Committee orchestrated the search and selection of the Interim Minister, Pastor Gary Shahinian. The T1 Committee will continue as the Pastoral Relations Committee for the Interim Pastor for the length of his ministry at EWCC. The T2 Committee will be the bridge with the T1 Committee and produce the Church Profile. The T2 Committee will be the bridge with the Search and Call Committee (SCC) who will identify and present the Settled Pastor candidate to the EWCC Congregation. Both Committees will be approved at the January 26, 2025 EWCC Annual Meeting.

The T2 Committee will develop the EWCC Profile which is a high stakes document for EWCC and will make our community of faith come to life for prospective pastors. The T2 Committee (10-12 members) will divide itself into teams to develop multiple perspectives on EWCC. (Possible perspectives include: The Village of East Woodstock, Life of the Church, Youth, Online and Remote Congregants, Visitation and Institutional Knowledge, Community Connections). The committee members, and teams, will engage Pastor Gary and others in the church and community with knowledge of these areas. Information will be gathered by 1:1 or group conversations, surveys, or other means of gaining details, so that the development of each perspective is thorough. The EWCC Profile must be approved by the Congregation by June 30, 2025 and the Area UCC Conference and the UCC National by September 15, 2025.

The Profile will be posted by October 1, 2025 within the UCC communication framework for review by UCC sanctioned pastors. The SCC (7-9 members) will start their review following a handoff meeting with T2 in the fall of 2025. Pastors that are interested in EWCC will notify us through the UCC communication framework and then the SCC will review those pastors profiles to identify candidates for further consideration. It is anticipated that the optimum time for the widest choice of candidates will occur between January and May 2026. The SCC will periodically report status to the congregation while maintaining candidate confidentiality. The SCC will narrow the search to one candidate and then orchestrate a "candidating" weekend for the candidate and their family including a social opportunity with the congregation, a worship leadership opportunity and vote on the Settled Pastor by the EWCC Congregation before the end of June 2026. The SCC will coordinate with Society to finalize the call agreement, compensation package and contract for the Settled Pastor plus congregational vote (as required by IRS) before the end of June 2026. The SCC will orchestrate the on-boarding of the new Settled Pastor beginning in late August 2026.

Our charge is to be a conduit of information and feedback between Pastor Gary and the congregation. We anticipate continuing to meet regularly throughout the interim process. We wish to express our gratitude to Pastor Gary and to the congregation for their flexibility, resilience and willingness to learn, evolve and grow throughout this time of significant change and exploration.

PASTOR'S REPORT

As I write this report, I will have completed four months as the Intentional Interim Pastor of the church. That has been enough time for me to see that the East Woodstock Congregational Church holds great significance in the lives of its members. I am very impressed with the commitment to the church that I see among many of you. Such commitment bodes well for the future of this congregation. You have embraced me with open hearts and open minds and I am thankful to be here to minister alongside you.

Fundamental to the life of any church is the worship service. We are blessed with a very talented pianist/organist, Nancy Ducharme, whose opening preludes transport us into the right mood for worship. Our faithful choir members splendidly lead the congregation in its praise to God, often singing challenging pieces with ease and enthusiasm. Andy Tomkins masterfully directs our Bell Choir which always adds inspiration to the worship service when they play. Our broadcasting and sound team of Val Law, John Davis, Karen Ryker, and Tom Stokes produce quality videos of the services that can be watched at any time.

In addition to Sunday morning services, we hosted a Quiet Christmas service for those who feel sad or overwhelmed during the holiday season as well as two Christmas Eve services, one displaying the musical talents of our children and youth and the other depicting a more peaceful candlelight service. I have also presided over funeral services for Jerry Moschella, Naomi Gee, Rae Tremblay-Webb, Merton Hill, and Lorene Matsen. And I have officiated at the wedding of J. D. Mordasky III and Megan Hebert. Christine Lessig and I attended the installation service of Rev. Pam Briddle, the recently settled minister of the Congregational Church of Putnam, which was a very festive celebration for our neighbor church. Christine also attended the Greater Putnam Interfaith Council Thanksgiving service hosted by the B'nai Shalom Synagogue in Putnam, which drew attendees from several religious houses of worship. It is important that we gather with sister churches in the United Church of Christ (UCC) as well as with other churches and faith traditions. The UCC has chosen as its motto "That They May All Be One," which we need always to keep in focus. Ecumenical and interfaith relationships are a very important aspect of our testimony to others of our Christian faith.

I am indebted to Mary Oliver, the church's Office Manager, who is a great help to me in carrying out the church's day to day operations. As the face of the church, Mary does a wonderful job at greeting those who come to the church building, call the church on the telephone, and email the church. She is very efficient at handling all kinds of clerical work and keeps the church's operations running smoothly. I am also very thankful for Diane Billings, who accompanies me on visits to those who are unable to gather with us on Sundays. Diane keeps in continual communication with members of the congregation and informs me of those who would like a visit.

I also very much appreciate Windsor White who attends all the Confirmation classes and leads the class once a month when I am in New Jersey" to "I also very much appreciate Windsor White who attends all the Confirmation classes and leads the class once a month while I attend the Diaconate meeting. Windsor contributes much to the

class and everyone appreciates his wry humor. And I cannot forget to thank Glen Lessig who is always on duty to fix the toilets when they are not functioning properly. Also special thanks to Jeff Wong for his expertise in making sure that our office computers are working the way they should (and in stamping out fires!).

The committee meetings run very smoothly in this congregation and the chairs are very effective in setting the agendas and directing the meetings. I clearly see that this congregation's lay leadership is very capable. That's a very good sign in showing the church's strength. Especially during the interim period, many in the congregation are stepping up to the plate to assume leadership positions in making sure that the ministries, missions, and programs of the church continue.

I am also excited by what is going on in the Sunday School. We should be thankful that we have had as many as 15 students attending classes on Sunday morning. That may not sound like a lot but it is. Quite a few churches, even some larger than ours, do not have a Sunday School because they don't have any children. Director of Christian Education Jessica Weaver Boose does a marvelous job of educating the young ones, which you see every Sunday morning during the worship service. Many of you witnessed the Sunday School Pageant on December 15 and saw the enthusiasm of the children and their desire and love for Jesus Christ. Continuing to attract young families is very important and should be seen as a priority. The educational ministry of the church is not an option. Every church is called to be a school. We are a school devoted to making disciples of Jesus Christ.

I very much enjoy teaching the Confirmation Class on Sunday morning following the worship service. We have a class of very bright young people: Henry Griffin, Haven Magnan, Gabby Santos, Adian Vuillemot, and Gigi Young. In addition to attending class, the group prepared and brought 50 lunches to Worcester Fellowship, a ministry to people experiencing homelessness, and attended their worship service on January 5 outside All Saints Episcopal Church, a renowned Worcester congregation. The class will also be traveling to Boston in March on a CityReach Mission Trip, where they will spend overnight learning about homelessness.

I very much enjoy teaching our enthusiastic group of "scholars" who attend our weekly Bible Study. We started at the beginning of October on the topic of "How to Read the Bible" and are still discussing this most important issue, not because I am long-winded (I hope that I'm not!) but because of the many thought-provoking comments generated by the subject. I am heartened that we have such a dedicated group of women who eagerly desire to learn how to read and understand the Bible, the treasure trove of our faith. We always welcome newcomers to the group (especially guys, who are inexplicably absent)

I'm also amazed by the many missions that our congregation supports and how much we give to missions, locally, regionally, nationally, and internationally.

I very much enjoy the visits that I am having with individual members of the congregation, whether at their homes or in my office. I look forward to having many more of them. You don't need to wait until I contact you for a visit. You can get in touch with me first. These visits are very valuable not only in my becoming familiar with you but also because you share with me your views of the church and your hopes and dreams for it. This information needs to be articulated during this interim time because all of it will go into the Church Profile that will be written by the Transition Team 2 and read by prospective ministerial candidates for the position of Settled Pastor.

The heart of any church is its people. The people of our church are devoted followers of Jesus Christ who are involved in ministering to other members and engaged in the local community and beyond with a vibrant Christian witness.

A lot of work needs to get done in this year. I am confident that the congregation will face the challenge constructively and dutifully. Change is very difficult for many. But from what I have seen thus far, this congregation is confronting the prospect of change admirably with courage and conviction as you seek to discern what God is calling you to be and to do as a community of faith pledged to promote God's kingdom in your midst and in the world.

DIACONATE

The primary role of the deacons became increasingly significant in 2024, as they navigated the transitional period leading to the retirement of Pastor Sue Foster in June. Upholding the values and mission of the East Woodstock Congregational Church, the deacons played a pivotal role in ensuring continuity and stability during this time. A key focus was facilitating "knowledge transfer," with Pastor Sue sharing essential details about the church's daily operations, many of which were undocumented formally.

In preparation for Pastor Sue's departure, the deacons arranged for visiting pastors to provide pulpit coverage during the summer months and attended shared summer services at the First Congregational Church of Woodstock to provide a welcoming and familiar presence. Their responsibilities also included leading prayers, reading scripture, and offering spiritual guidance during services. Additionally, the deacons supported the church community by assisting with an increased number of memorial services throughout the year, reflecting their commitment to compassion and care.

The efforts of the deacons in 2024 exemplify their dedication to the spiritual health and organizational well-being of the church, particularly during times of change and growth. Their work ensures the continued strength and vibrancy of the East Woodstock Congregational Church community.

Throughout the year:

- Assisted in the planning and execution of worship services including in person and online Sunday services as well as special services.
- Assisted pastor in the administration of sacraments, particularly in the celebration of Communion on the first Sunday of each month and key holidays.
- Coordinated and assisted with special services, such as baptisms, weddings, and memorial services.
- Supported the church's mission through active participation in church governance and serving as a resource for both clergy and congregation.

January – March

- Accepted the retirement announcement of Pastor Sue Foster after 36 years of service to East Woodstock Congregational Church
- Hosted second annual Breakfast Church in conjunction with the annual meeting
- Supported Jazz Sunday with music, soups, and fellowship
- Assisted with Ash Wednesday in conjunction with the First Church of Woodstock and Church of the Good Shepherd
- Added the role of "exit deacon" to the Assistant Deacon of the Day's responsibilities to assure there
 was a greeter after church for those who did not exit through Fellowship Hall
- Assisted with the blessing of the prayer shawls
- Continued to work through increased "Safe Church" measures on how to keep the church community safe during worship
- Hosted Maundy Thursday, Good Friday, and Easter Services
- Three deacons attended the New England Conference for Congregational Churches to learn more about how to help during the expected transition period

April – June

- Assisted with multiple baptisms as families looked to plan for baptismal services prior to Pastor Sue's departure
- Participated in Pastor Sue's final service and all took part in the release of her vows
- Secured visiting pastors from June 23 July 28 and assisted visiting pastors in leading service
- Assisted in the coordination of Confirmation Sunday

July - September

- Partnered with The First Congregational Church of Woodstock ("The Hill Church") for summer services.
- Hosted welcome dinner and introduction meeting on Pastor Gary Shahinian's first official day at EWCC
- Assisted with Rally Day to kick off the start of the new Sunday School Year.
- Served as lay readers for the month of September while Pastor Gary met with church members and got his bearings.
- Worked with Pastor Gary to get confirmation class started with five confirmands

CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

2024 was a joyfully busy year!

January through June we often had 15 students in Sunday School, ranging from age 4 to 14. The patterns of the children attending communion on the first Sunday of the month and having children's chapel on the last Sunday of the month, were balanced with classes for older and younger kids or one room schoolhouse gatherings. We had multiple new families visit during the spring, often as attendees of a family member's baptism, and some came back multiple times.

Also in January, Jessica led the confirmation class in participating in CityReach. CityReach is a 24 hour service experience with the homeless community of Boston, led, and created by common cathedral. We had a preparation lesson, gathered donations, did the actual experience of CityReach, then one Sunday the confirmation students brought the experience back to the church by creating and producing a special fellowship. This was appreciated by many and will hopefully be repeated in 2025.

During the winter and spring months a few lessons were highlighted with clips from the movie *Godspell*. They studied the lesson from Matthew where Jesus tells us we are the salt of the earth and we are to shine our light in the world. This was all shared in multiple ways during Children's Sunday and Pastor Sue's last worship at EWCC.

We continued Vacation Bible School (VBS) meeting once a week on Wednesday evenings in July. We had a wonderful demonstration of how to be a church by multiple volunteers helping with the meals and the classes each week. The campers created a large mural over the course of the four weeks and they enjoyed making beaded bracelets each week. Every activity was tied into the theme of Pray and Play. Attendees ranged from First through 8th grade graduates and in total there were 12 campers, over the 4 weeks.

This fall Dorrie Scranton stepped in as CE chair and pulled together a CE committee. Having a committee has led to discussions of how to attract and retain new families with multiple suggestions being implemented.

At least once a month we offer classes divided by age groups, with the plan of making it happen twice a month for 2025. We have ages 3 to 13 start together for our own worship rituals and then divide for age appropriate Bible lessons and conversations. We have studied the sacrament of communion, service (creating and serving fellowship), how Jesus taught us to love everyone, and the Christmas Story.

In 2025, Lynn Looby will be stepping down as the manager of our background checks. We are so appreciative of all the work she did to help us live into the UCC's safe church best practices over the past decade. Emily Murphy will be taking over this task.

The children appreciate being an active part of the church family and serving the congregation by occasionally presenting lessons, such as the Christmas Pageant and on Children's Sunday.

Our EWCC Christian Education programming would not work without the input of many. I do not trust myself to remember everyone here. The support, input, ideas, activities, supplies, and time have made 2024 a solid and cheerful year of Christian Education for the youngest participants of the EWCC.

The mission of the Outreach Committee is to share God's love, hope and healing, and to support our neighbors. We serve as the outreach arm of our Church, soliciting, gathering, and distributing support of all kinds according to the needs of the members of our Church, the community, and the world. We believe in effecting change through hands-on community involvement, engaging our congregation to share in the joy and grace of generous giving.

OUTREACH MISSION STATEMENT - ADOPTED JANUARY 29, 2023

The loving hearts, listening ears, and willing hands of our congregation make it possible for the Outreach Committee to fulfill its mission each year. For your compassion and generous giving, we thank you.

A record of the local, national, and international charities supported through the Outreach Committee can be found in the report of the Outreach treasurer, following this report. In addition to these gifts, Outreach's on-going projects strive to share God's love, hope, and healing.

Once again, in 2024, a great deal of energy and many resources were devoted to food support through the following activities:

First Friday Food Fair continues to be used by the community. We offer this service on each first Friday of the month from 9:00 to 10:00. We have a consistent number of patrons who come to receive non-perishables, and meat and vegetables when available. We appreciate food donations from the congregation which keep this program in operation.

The Caring Continues provides food for families of children in the Woodstock school system who are in need of

food assistance. Dave Magee of the Evangelical Covenant Church is the coordinator of this program, which is made possible through the efforts and donations of East Woodstock Congregational Church, South Woodstock Baptist Church, Faith Bible Church, Woodstock Covenant Church and United International Foods. Our church generously responds to an ever changing need for certain food items which helps to keep the Caring Continues Pantry well stocked. Lynn Hescheles and Donna Baldyga go to the Woodstock Academy South campus every six weeks to pack bags of food which are delivered to the Middle and Elementary schools for the children to bring home.

Community Kitchen - EWCC provides one meal a month for community kitchen at First Congregational Church. We are now serving between 80-90 each week. Special thanks to Kerstin Forrester, who has retired as our coordinator after years of service. We also thank Barbara Hackett, Donna Baldyga and their "crew" for coordinating and cooking.

Freezer Meals - Outreach maintains a supply of meals in our freezer that can be delivered to those experiencing illness or difficult circumstances. We stock the freezer by preparing meals as need dictates. Meals are available and used by Pastor Sue, and now available to Pastor Gary when visiting community members at home who are sick or would appreciate a meal and a visit!

Take Them a Meal - With the help of the "Take them a Meal" web site, our congregation provided meals for one person who was undergoing challenging circumstances this past year.

TEEG (Thompson Ecumenical Empowerment Group)-Supporting Wellness at Pantry' (SWAP) - Our Church generously partners with TEEG In two major missions, in addition to our donation to support the Woodstock Fuel Assistance Fund. Our springtime "Bring Your Cooler to Church" was held on April 28th providing hundreds of pounds of food from ground beef and pork to fresh vegetables, cheese and eggs. It was an inspiring sight to see the TEEG truck being filled by a continuous line of our parishioners laden with gifts of food.

Thanksgiving Baskets - Baskets full of food donated by the congregation and supplemented by Outreach were delivered to Covenant to Care (26) and local families (3).

OTHER ON-GOING OUTREACH PROGRAMS AND PARTNERSHIPS

Covenant to Care for Children - Liaison Pam Brown worked with social workers Ana Rodrlguez and Matt Gilbert to facilitate several activities that provided for children and families in this program:

- Easter Baskets were provided for 30 children
- Thanksgiving Baskets were provided for 26 DCF families and 3 members of our church community.
- Christmas gifts were provided for 18 children
- Furniture/storage for a foster child was provided
- A new foster child was provided with a birthday gift

WAIM (Windham Area Interfaith Ministries) - Andy Krofina continues as our liaison with the organization and volunteers frequently at the office there. We had a workday in May at WAIM staffed by our confirmands. Andy continues to bring items to WAIM from our congregation.

Emergency Shelter/No Freeze Shelter - Liaison Diane Billings continues to work with the shelter manager to help with their needs. There is a constant need for personal care items, so we appreciate items donated by the congregation. At Christmas the congregation provided \$25 gift certificates so that the staff of the shelter could provide Christmas items for the adults and children/teens who are in the Shelter.

Support Team – Christine Lessig continues to coordinate church member volunteers who assist church members with rides and other unusual or emergency needs.

Domestic Violence Shelter – Cris Waldron coordinated the provision of Easter buckets for 7 children at Easter and gifts at Christmas for 7 children. They are still waiting for renovations to take place at the shelter. New or gently used towels can always be used by them.

Prayer Shawls made by members of our congregation continue to provide comfort and support to those going through difficult situations. Many shawls were distributed this year. Thank you to Barbara Hackett for her leadership on this project, and our talented knitters who work throughout the year creating beautiful shawls.

The Card Ministry continues under the capable leadership of Karen Ryker, Pam Brown, and Diane Billings. An average of 35 cards per month are sent out to members and friends who are homebound, ill, mourning a loss, or just needing some cheer. Their encouragement is deeply appreciated by the recipients.

TEEG - In August, knowing school bells would soon be ringing, we once again partnered with the First Congregational Church of Woodstock for our "Back to School Supplies" drive. Getting children off to a great start armed with the supplies they need is paramount to their success...and we did just that! Boxes upon boxes of supplies, from notebooks, binders and loose-leaf paper to pens, pencils and backpacks, were delivered to TEEG for distribution to those in need. Once again, an amazing response was made possible by the generosity and caring nature of our congregation.

LGBQT – We continue our support of the LGBQT community with display of two banners—one hangs outside on our church building and the other on the inside in Fellowship Hall. In addition, we have a small table in Fellowship Hall with a small lending library of books about LGBQT issues; a listing of books that are available at Woodstock Libraries, and a list of support resources in the community.

On May 4, over twelve EWCC members attended the First Gay Pride Day (in Northeastern CT) celebration in near-by Putnam, at Rotary Park. Our booth had all the supplies to make Friendship bracelets, bottles of water, rainbow lollipops and brochures of EWCC mission and programs. The entire day was a huge success. The entire team wore Pride banner t-shirts with the words "A just world for all". We continued our financial support for the Woodstock Academy "Gender and Sexualities Alliance" (GSA). We have heard from community members how supportive this group has been to LGBQT students and their families. We also have continued our financial support of the Hadwen Park, UCC in Worcester, that provides a safe haven for LGBQT folks around the world who are fleeing persecution, injury, and death threats due to their sexuality.

World Vision - Our congregation continues the sponsorship of Inne, a four-year old child from South Africa. Our contributions benefit both Inne and his community. Melanie LaMountain is our committee liaison to World Vision and Inne. She has been communicating with Inne and has sent him letters about our life in Woodstock and sent the most recent picture of our congregation that was taken in June.

Kiva – Under the leadership of Christine Lessig, we continue to support four agricultural micro-businesses with \$25 loans through KIVA to low-income/underserved female entrepreneurs in Kenya, Sierra Leone, Guatemala, and Bolivia. These loans are paid back and reinvested to help alleviate poverty.

The needs in our church, our community, our nation, and our world are real. We stand ready and willing to listen, to help, and to share God's love. Thank you to the congregation for partnering with us to make this possible.

SOCIETY COMMITTEE

The Society committee met monthly throughout 2024 for detailed discussions and review of our church's various financial and property management issues. Thanks to the efforts of our committee members and many, many volunteers, we were able to address these issues. EWCC is fortunate to have a strong financial team led by Treasurer DeEtta Spalding, Assistant Treasurer Lynn Looby, and John Davis Collector. We are indeed fortunate to have the support of these qualified and dedicated volunteers.

- Due to the retirement of our long-serving Office Manager, Heidi Tucker, our church needed a new office manager. Society has completed the recruitment process and is delighted to have Mary Oliver as our new Office Manager.
- Society supported the first Transition Team in the Interim Search contract negotiation process.
- Our children's playground is in the process of being updated. The shed has been removed, equipment cleaned, and plans for 2025 of railroad ties removed and grass reestablished.
- Kitchen maintenance continued with LED lighting, and a new hot water booster was installed to solve our long-term dishwasher issues.
- Implemented the online productivity suite Google Workspace for our church. Workspace will allow us to collaborate and share files easily, access needed cloud file storage, manage church calendars, and run online meetings.
- A Security sub-committee with the Deacons was established to consider the various security concerns of our church. The committee has met monthly and is in the process of addressing multiple security concerns. Several policies are in the development stage, including door locking, first aid, fire drills, etc. A Ring camera was installed for office staff when working alone.
- A 64" Smart TV was installed in Fellowship Hall.
- A Maintenance team was established with a comprehensive ongoing maintenance schedule. A volunteer committee was formed, including Eddie Hrysan, Peter Green, Andy Hescheles, and Glen Lessig. Many projects were completed, including rebuilding the bulkhead doors, painting the north side of the Parsonage ell, and cleaning the west and south sides of the church buildings.
- Employment contracts for all staff were reviewed and completed.
- The committee has received designs and proposals from three contractors. Currently, an RFQ is being completed, and the remodeling project is planned to begin in mid-2025.
- Proposals for an upgraded fire alarm system have been received; this is a priority for the committee to complete in early 2025.
- Judith Wong again organized a very productive Jeans Sunday this autumn. Current plans are to complete and add a Spring Clean-Up day in 2025.
- Judith Wong continued to coordinate the Refurbishment Committee, a sub-committee of Society. Please see the Refurbishment Committee report for more details.

Society would like to thank DeEtta again for her professional and tireless efforts to meet our church's financial needs.

REFURBISHMENT COMMITTEE, A SUBCOMMITTEE OF SOCIETY

The Refurbishment Committee, a subcommittee of Society, was formed to spearhead the East Woodstock Congregational Church sanctuary and narthex refurbishment, meeting both the current and future needs of our congregation while respecting the Church's history and blended architecture.

Highlights of 2024:

This year the Committee focused on learning more about the Church's architectural history and applying for a second pre-planning 50/50 grant:

• Research: Historical consultant Myron Stachiw generously donated his time and talents to research and prepare an Historic Structures Report detailing the Church's architectural history. Christine Thomson's paint analysis further enriched this knowledge. Myron's findings were presented to the congregation in May. His presentation included architectural findings, and a chronology of construction and alterations of the sanctuary and narthex that will help us better understand the physical and aesthetic evolution of our Church buildings. Abundant thanks to Myron, Christine, and Dawn Adiletta for their efforts to uncover this rich history and their work on the grant process. - **Grant Application:** The committee submitted a pre-planning grant application with the State Historical Preservation Office (SHPO). The Historic Structures Report was an important part of this application. While our pre-planning grant was denied, Myron's report is a treasured part of our Church's historical records, and will be invaluable for future grant applications and refurbishment recommendations presented for congregational approval.
- Ongoing Work: Without the grant and the lack of available Church funds, major refurbishment work is on hold
 through our transition period. Despite the grant denial, the committee continues its work. Plans are underway to
 create "as built" architectural drawings, and Society will address any potential roof repairs required by SHPO for
 future grant applications.
- Special thanks to:

DeEtta Spalding for installing rechargeable stairway lights in the balcony stairwells for evening events. **Peter Green** for diligently matching and touching up paint colors throughout the church. **Barbara and Stewart Morse** for offering to donate an historic pewter communion set for display. **Dawn Adiletta** for her work in exploring additional funding sources and preparing future grant applications. SHPO's grant cycle reopens in 2025, and we expect to reapply.

Sincere gratitude to our dedicated **Refurbishment Committee members** who bring together their collective knowledge to support our anticipated refurbishments, and to **YOU**, **our congregation** for continued interest in shaping EWCC's future. Please consider volunteering to help run our A/V equipment during services, and consider sharing your Church historical photos, records, and memorabilia to enhance EWCC's ongoing story.

We are reminded that we are ALL stewards of our beloved sacred spaces. We pray that our Church may always be a place where the people of God may gather in worship and community and recognize God's loving presence. Our work on the Refurbishment Committee and the ongoing support of our faith community lays the groundwork for future congregations at East Woodstock Congregational Church.
