

Keep awake, therefore, for you do not know on what day your Lord is coming.

Matthew 24:42 NRSVue

The liturgical calendar calls us to remember expectation. While our memories of the days preceding Christmas may include anticipating gifts and festival gathering around meals and decorated trees, that is not the memory Advent amplifies. While Epiphany greets us at the dawn of a new year, memories of midnight toast and kisses does not frame that season. Lent may evoke shudders as we consider how difficult it may have been to forgo that favorite practice, menu item, or other thing in order to share in the sacrificial activity of Christ. Yet, if that struggle fails to generate empathy for the suffering of our neighbor on our block and across the world, the sacrifice was empty. A sunrise service on Easter Sunday morning may transport our imagination to the empty tomb, but that shocking moment led to uncertainty, discovery, and an empowered movement that launched on the Day of Pentecost and continues today.

The future of the church faces threats. While some have the reasonable fear of closing church doors, the more urgent and salient problem is the church that has lost its way, its voice, its witness, and its commitment to embodying good news in the world as Christ's agents in the world.

The call to remember expectation is a call to hope, to agency, and to activation in a world in need of conduits and co-creators of good news. In the anchoring text for the liturgical year, Jesus cautioned and encouraged their

followers to "keep awake." The command encompasses attentiveness, alertness, and readiness. The context of the passage emphasizes the anticipated return of Christ, the Chosen One. Could the Body of Christ reclaim its mantle and mandate to embody God's love and liberating power in the world? Could that be the return we expect...to the movement to follow the way of Jesus in spirit and in truth...not to give us an escape to heaven but to realize the kingdom on earth through our collective, Spirit-led salvific acts in the name of Jesus? Are we prepared and willing to be that church?

That is the question we will ponder this year even as we heed the call to "Stay Awake."

pastor's incesage

The angels announced the miraculous and wondrous birth of the Lord Jesus Christ to lowly and simple shepherds who were watching over their sheep in a field. Did you ever wonder why the angels did not make their glorious pronouncement to kings, the wealthy, or the temple priests? Why were peasant shepherds the first to hear this most astonishing of all announcements?

Perhaps it was to make clear right from the beginning of his life that Jesus was to become the greatest shepherd of all, the Great Shepherd of our salvation.

We should notice that sheep and shepherds hold an important significance in the scriptures. Sheep are mentioned more than any other animal in the Bible, over 400 times. Their meat was eaten at sacrificial meals, their skin was used for clothing, and the ram's horns were utilized for musical instruments (Joshua 6:4) and oil containers (I Samuel 16:1).

Though shepherding was considered a common occupation, it was nevertheless very important. Shepherding a flock of sheep required constantly moving them to new pastures in search of sustenance, ensuring an abundant and clean water supply, and always being vigilant for any who might wander astray. The shepherd's responsibilities further included guarding the sheep from attacks of predators and wild animals, such as bears, lions, and wolves, often placing the shepherd's own life in danger to protect the flocks.

Yet despite the value of this job, shepherding a flock was frowned upon by many in the ancient



Near East, sometimes even despised. We read in the Book of Genesis 46:34 that Joseph informs his father and brothers that "all shepherds are abhorrent to the Egyptians."

Nevertheless some of the most important figures in the Old Testament, such as Moses, David, and Amos worked as shepherds during some part of their life. Even the Hebrew patriarchs Abraham, Isaac, and Jacob were shepherds.

Of these, David is the most well known as a shepherd. He was a shepherd from his youth. Psalm 78 says about him that God "chose his servant David, and took him from the sheepfolds; from tending the nursing ewes he brought him to be the shepherd of his people Jacob, of Israel, his inheritance. With upright heart he tended them, and guided them with skillful hand" (Psalm 78:70-72).

And herein lies the key, I think, to why God chose to reveal the birth of the only begotten Son, Jesus Christ, to shepherds. Jesus was to grow up to become our Great Shepherd.

As a kind and wise shepherd, Jesus does not condemn his flock as worthless sinners who deserve to be eaten by wolves, but rather, as lost and helpless sheep who need to be found and brought back safely home. It is interesting that those who minister for Jesus Christ are called pastors, which is another name for "shepherds."

Jesus was born in the humble surroundings of a stable and placed in a dirty manger, a feeding trough for animals. His birth would be announced to lowly shepherds who realized the importance of such good tidings and sought out the baby in the manger. Christ did not force his birth upon the people of that time. When he grew up, he did not coerce his way into their lives during his ministry. Rather he led the way to eternal salvation as a kind and caring shepherd for any who were willing to listen and to follow him. He taught and ministered compassionately through parables, miracles, and personal sacrifice to gain the attention of sinful and troubled souls. He served as a shepherd who went ahead of the sheep, not driving them from behind. He led them toward that which was good and away from danger and wrongdoing, ultimately preparing the way for entrance into eternal life. At this time of year when we make plans to celebrate the birthday of Jesus Christ, may we all renew our commitment to following our "Great Shepherd."

As we gather around our own tables this week, may we remember the wider table we are setting together, a table big enough for every child of God.


Thank you for being a Conference committed to justice, mercy, and love. Thank you for your faithfulness. Thank you for showing the world what hope looks like in action.
